Themes, Character, and Setting

1. Ginevra's identity and power

O How does Ginevra's relationship with her gift (gemstone magic / healing) evolve over the course of the story?

2. Faith, superstition, and religion

 What critiques or observations does Rasche seem to make about religious power and corruption? How does the tension between true faith and the exploitation of belief play out?

3. Power, control, and corruption

Which characters wield institutional or social power? How do they abuse or justify it? How does the theft of relics become a battleground for power and control?

4. Plague, mortality, and crisis

o In what ways does the backdrop of the Black Death influence the characters' choices and the atmosphere of the story? Does the plague function solely as a historical setting, or does it carry symbolic weight (e.g. internal decay, spiritual sickness)?

5. Gender, agency, and marginalization

o How does being a woman affect Ginevra's opportunities and the way others treat her?

6. Trust, betrayal, and alliances

Who surprises you by whom they support (or betray)? Where do alliances shift, and what motivates those shifts? How does trust function in a society where accusation (witchcraft, heresy) is lethal?

7. Mysticism, knowledge, and the unknown

o How does knowledge (scientific, mystical, religious) serve as both tool and weapon?

Plot, Structure, and Style

8. Setting and atmosphere

How vividly did you feel transported to 14th-century Florence?

9. Supporting characters and point of view

Which secondary characters did you find most compelling, and why? Are there characters whose motivations surprised you or whose actions felt inconsistent?

10. Ending and resolution

 Was the ending satisfying? Did the fates of the characters feel earned? What questions were left unanswered (if any)?

Deeper / "Big Picture" Questions

12. Ethics of healing and power

o Ginevra's ability to heal is miraculous yet dangerous in that context. What ethical dilemmas does she face in using her gift (who to help, how openly, at what risk)? Is there a point where the act of healing becomes a tool of control or coercion?

13. Human agency vs larger forces

 To what degree are characters acting freely, and to what degree are they constrained by history, disease, social norms, or supernatural forces?

14. Legacy, memory, and sanctity

O Why are relics so valued—and dangerous—in the story? What do they represent beyond the religious? How is legacy (of saints, of knowledge, of family) used and contested in the novel?

15. Resilience and hope in dark times

O Despite the dread and loss, where do you see perseverance, hope, or redemption in the novel?
